The Holy Gospel John 6:1-21

The Gospeller introduces the Gospel and the people respond with "Glory to you, Lord Christ"

Jesus went to the other side of the Sea of Galilee, also called the Sea of Tiberias. A large crowd kept following him, because they saw the signs that he was doing for the sick. Jesus went up the mountain and sat down there with his disciples. Now the Passover, the festival of the Jews, was near. When he looked up and saw a large crowd coming toward him, Jesus said to Philip, "Where are we to buy bread for these people to eat?" He said

this to test him, for he himself knew what he was going to do. Philip answered him, "Six months' wages would not buy enough bread for each of them to get a little." One of his disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, said to him, "There is a boy here who has five barley loaves and two fish. But what are they among so many people?" Jesus said, "Make the people sit down." Now there was a great deal of grass in the place; so they sat down, about five thousand in all. Then Jesus took the loaves, and when he had given thanks, he distributed them to those who were seated; so also the fish, as much as they wanted. When they were satisfied, he told his disciples, "Gather up the fragments left over, so that nothing may be lost." So they gathered them up, and from the fragments of the five barley loaves, left by those who had eaten, they filled twelve baskets. When the people saw the sign that he had done, they began to say, "This is indeed the prophet who is to come into the world." When Jesus realized that they were about to come and take him by force to make him king, he withdrew again to the mountain by himself. When evening came, his disciples went down to the sea, got into a boat, and started across the sea to Capernaum. It was now dark, and Jesus had not yet come to them. The sea became rough because a strong wind was blowing. When they had rowed about three or four miles, they saw Jesus walking on the sea and coming near the boat, and they were terrified. But he said to them, "It is I; do not be afraid." Then they wanted to take him into the boat, and immediately the boat reached the land toward which they were going.

InAsMuch Offering for July—U.C. Berkeley Food Pantry

Coordinated by the Social Justice Committee, St. Mark's sponsors a monthly InAsMuch offering named after Jesus' appeal in the Gospel of Matthew to feed the hungry, give drink to the thirsty, welcome the stranger, clothe the naked, care for the sick, and visit those in prison: "In as much as you have done it into one of the least of these... you have done it unto me".

Last month St. Mark's raised funds for Berkeley Food and Housing Project. For a full list of the ministries scheduled this year, please see the 2021 calendar published in The Lion.

This month we dedicate our offering to the UC Berkeley Food Pantry, founded in 2014 to provide emergency nutrition support for students and staff in need. New statistics show that with rising tuition and housing costs, more than 30% of students are at risk, especially those who identify as multi-ethnic, Black, LGBTQ+, and first generation. Led by students, the Food Pantry is housed in the lower level of the Martin Luther King, Jr. Student Union UCBFP, where it offers food assistance programs provided by CalFresh, a campus farm and several gardens, and offers many skills workshops. Despite some disruption by the Coronavirus, the Pantry runs a monthly grocery bag program and has organized a pop-up pantry five days a week.
