




First Lesson


Second Lesson

Romans 8:1-11

There is no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus. For the law of the Spirit of life in Christ Jesus has set you free from the law of sin and of death. For God has done what the law, weakened by the flesh, could not do: by sending his own Son in the likeness of sinful flesh, and to deal with sin, he condemned sin in the flesh, so that the just requirement of the law might be fulfilled in us, who walk not according to the flesh but according to the Spirit. For those who live according to the flesh set their minds on the things of the flesh, but those who live according to the Spirit set their minds on the things of the flesh, but to set the mind on the Spirit is life and peace. For this reason the mind

that is set on the flesh is hostile to God; it does not submit to God's law-- indeed it cannot, and those who are in the flesh cannot please God. But you are not in the flesh; you are in the Spirit, since the Spirit of God dwells in you. Anyone who does not have the Spirit of Christ does not belong to him. But if Christ is in you, though the body is dead because of sin, the Spirit is life because of righteousness. If the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead dwells in you, he who raised Christ from the dead will give life to your mortal bodies also through his Spirit that dwells in you.

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The Holy Gospel

Matthew 13:1-9, 18-23

"The Gospeller introduces the Gospel and the people respond with "Glory to you, Lord Christ."

Jesus went out of the house and sat beside the sea. Such great crowds gathered around him that he got into a boat and sat there, while the whole crowd stood on the beach. And he told them many things in parables, saying: "Listen! A sower went out to sow. And as he sowed, some seeds fell on the path, and the birds came and ate them up. Other seeds fell on rocky ground, where they did not have much soil, and they sprang up quickly, since they had no depth of soil. But when the sun rose, they were scorched; and since they had no root, they withered away. Other seeds fell among thorns, and the thorns grew up and choked them. Other seeds fell on good soil and brought forth grain, some a hundredfold, some sixty, some thirty. Let anyone with ears listen!" "Hear then the parable of the sower. When anyone hears the word of the kingdom and does not understand it, the evil one comes and snatches away what is sown in the heart; this is what was sown on the path. As for what was sown on rocky ground, this is the one who hears the word and immediately receives it with joy; yet such a person has no root, but endures only for a while, and when trouble or persecution arises on account of the word, that person immediately falls away. As for what was sown among thorns, this is the one who hears the word by the cares of the world and the lure of wealth choke the word, and it yields nothing. But as for what was sown on good soil, this is the one who hears the word and understands it, who indeed bears fruit and yields, in one case a hundredfold, in another sixty, and in another thirty."

The Gospeller concludes the Gospel and the people respond with "Praise to you, Lord Christ."

A Form for Spiritual Communion

In times like these where it is imprudent or impossible for all to receive Holy Communion, it is still possible to make an act of spiritual communion. The following devotion can be made at any time when you are prevented from being present at the Eucharist, but we encourage you to use it during these weeks of live-streamed services especially, at the time while communion is being administered and the ablutions performed. This form comes from a book of devotion, "The Habit of Holiness," by Martin Warner.

Make an Act of Spiritual Communion to unite your intention with that of the whole Church:

Lord Jesus Christ, saving Victim, Priest divine, in union with the faithful at every altar of your Church where your body and blood are offered to the Father, I make an oblation of praise and thanksgiving. I believe that you are truly present in the Eucharist. To you I offer my soul, my body, and my life. Come to my heart, embrace me with your love. Conform my will to the pattern of your perfect obedience, so that loving all that you love, I may never be separated from you, but live to the glory of God. Amen.

Pray the Lord's Prayer:

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy Name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.

Meditate on the soul's mystical union with Christ; 14th c. poem, 'Anima Christi' is a good place to start:

Soul of Christ, sanctify me. Body of Christ, save me. Blood of Christ, inebriate me. Water from the side of Christ, wash me. Passion of Christ, strengthen me. Within thy wounds hide me. Suffer me not to be separated from thee. From the malicious enemy defend me. In the hour of my death, call me and bid me come to thee, That with thy saints I may praise thee For ever and ever.

Offer a prayer of thanksgiving; this is one by St. Richard of Chichester:

Thanks be to thee, my Lord Jesus Christ, for all the benefits thou hast won for me, for all the pains and insults thou hast borne for me. O most merciful redeemer, friend and brother, may I know thee more clearly, love thee more dearly, and follow thee more nearly, day by day. Amen.

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Service Notes from the Director of Music

This morning, we sing the 15th century Latin setting of the Ordinary of the Mass known as *Missa de Angelis*. We began singing the *Gloria in Excelsis* in 2014. This familiar hymn begins with the words that the angels sang when the birth of Christ was announced to shepherds in the Gospel of Luke. The *Gloria in Excelsis* is part of the "Ordinary" of the Mass and musical settings of the *Gloria in excelsis* are found in *The Hymnal 1982* at S201-204 and S272-281, and in *Wonder, Love, and Praise* at 896-901. The other movements of the Ordinary are the *Kyrie, Credo, Sanctus,* and *Agnus Dei.* A setting of the *Sanctus* from *Missa de Angelis,* set in English, can be found at S-116 in *The Hymnal 1982*. Historically, settings of the Ordinary were offered only by a Schola or a choir. During the Reformation, musical settings were composed for the congregation to sing, most notably the first English setting composed by John Merbecke (1510?-1585?) found at S-90, S-201, S-113, and S-157 in *The Hymnal 1982*.

While it is has become the norm for congregations to sing Eucharistic settings in their native tongue, singing any portion of the service in a language other than our own opens up for us new possibilities of deepening our encounter with the Divine. For example, at St. Mark's we have sung *Kyrie eleison* in Greek, or original Latin settings of the *Sanctus* (S-122) and *Agnus Dei* (S-160). St. Mark's has also sung many Latin texts from the Taizé community in France (e.g. "Laudate Dominum" and "Ubi Caritas"). We have even sung some portions of the Psalms in Hebrew and an Arabic setting of the *Agnus Dei* from St. George's Anglican Cathedral in Jerusalem. *Wonder, Love, and Praise* has included a Latin setting of the *Agnus Dei*, Spanish and Chippewa settings of the *Sanctus*, a Latin setting of the "Our Father" and the Jewish "Sh'ma Yisrael" in Hebrew, as well as settings in Hawaiian and German. *The Hymnal 1982* includes Latin, Hebrew, and German hymn texts and additional settings of service music are available in *Enriching Our Music I and II. Voices Found* contains musical settings of texts in Latin, Swahili, Nigerian, Hebrew, Cherokee, Spanish, Akan, and Mandarin.

The Anglican Communion is a diverse body, and singing music in different languages, including the traditional Latin texts of Ordinary, is a wonderful gift and opportunity. St. Mark's is an exemplary and unique parish when it comes to openness to both music and text and for this, I am profoundly grateful. As many people say, "St. Mark's can sing anything!" So, this morning, we continue to learn and offer the *Missa de Angelis*, singing with Angels and Archangels and with all the company of heaven.

InAsMuch Offering June: UC Berkeley Food Pantry

First, we want to say thank you for those who helped our June InAsMuch! We raised \$102.12 for the Berkeley Food and Housing Project. Thank you all for sending checks and donating online!

It is estimated that more than 30% of college students lack the resources to meet their basic food needs. With rising college tuition, more students from lower-income families often work several jobs to make ends meet. Without enough food students are more likely to have low grades, be subject to depression and poor health. Multi-ethnic, Black, LGBTQ and first-generation students are especially at risk.

In the summer of 2014 UC Berkeley launched a food pantry to provide emergency supplemental nutrition support for undergraduates and graduate students in need. The pantry provided core food support for students and staff. This student led program, housed in the lower level of Martin Luther King, Jr. Student Union, supplements other food assistance programs provided by CalFresh, campus farm and gardens, and offers skills teaching/workshops.
