Welcome to St. Mark's!

The feast we keep today goes by many names: in the Episcopal Church its official name is the feast of the St. Mary the Virgin, in the Roman Catholic Church it is the Assumption, and in the Orthodox churches it is the Dormition. In all three communions, it is the principal feast throughout the year of Mary, "Mother of God" — from "Theotokos," the God-bearer, her ancient title from the undivided church, affirmed by the Council of Chalcedon in 451. Today's feast celebrates the day when, "the course of her earthly life being finished, God took her to himself." Christians do not agree on the exact manner of her departure from this life, but all do agree that she is special indeed: for the role she plays in the narrative of salvation, for the strength of her witness against the power structures of her day, and for the hope her example offers to everyone who follows in her footsteps. Insofar as we bear Christ to the world today, we share her vocation and can look forward to sharing her reward: truly, in her, God "hath put down the mighty from their seat, and hath exalted the humble and meek."





First Lesson

David assembled all Israel in Jerusalem to bring up the ark of the Lord to its place, which he had prepared for it. Then David gathered together the descendants of Aaron and the Levites. Second Lesson

Revelation 11:19a, 12:1-6a, 10ab

Then God's temple in heaven was opened, and the ark of his covenant was seen within his temple. A great portent appeared in heaven: a woman clothed with the sun, with the moon under her feet, and on her head a crown of twelve stars. She was pregnant and was crying out in birth pangs, in the agony of giving birth. Then another portent appeared in heaven: a great red dragon, with seven heads and ten horns, and seven diadems on his heads. His tail swept down a third of the stars of heaven and threw them to the earth. Then the dragon stood before the woman who was about to bear a child, so that he might devour her child as soon as it was born. And she gave birth to a son, a male child, who is to rule all the nations with a rod of iron. But her child was snatched away and taken to God and to his throne; and the woman fled into the wilderness, where she has a place prepared by God. Then I heard a loud voice in heaven, proclaiming, "Now have come the salvation and the power and the kingdom of our God and the authority of his Messiah."

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The Holy Gospel

Luke 1: 39-56

The Gospeller introduces the Gospel and the people respond with "Glory to you, Lord Christ."

In those days Mary set out and went with haste to a Judean town in the hill country, where she entered the house of Zechariah and greeted Elizabeth. When Elizabeth heard Mary's greeting, the child leaped in her womb. And Elizabeth was filled with the Holy Spirit and exclaimed with a loud cry, "Blessed are you among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb. And why has this happened to me, that the mother of my Lord comes to me? For as soon as I heard the sound of your greeting, the child in my womb leaped for joy. And blessed is she who believed that there would be a fulfillment of what was spoken to her by the Lord." And Mary said, "My soul magnifies the Lord, and my spirit rejoices in God my Savior, for he has looked with favor on the lowliness of his servant. Surely, from now on all generations will call me blessed; for the Mighty One has done great things for me, and holy is his name. His mercy is for those who fear him from generation to generation. He has shown strength with his arm; he has scattered the proud in the thoughts of their hearts. He has brought down the powerful from their thrones, and lifted up the lowly; he has filled the hungry with good things, and sent the rich away empty. He has helped his servant Israel, in remembrance of his mercy according to the promise he made to our ancestors, to Abraham and to his descendants forever." And Mary remained with her about three months and then returned to her home.

People: And also with you.



A Form for Spiritual Communion

In times like these where it is imprudent or impossible for all to receive Holy Communion, it is still possible to make an act of spiritual communion. The following devotion can be made at any time when you are prevented from being present at the Eucharist, but we encourage you to use it during these weeks of live-streamed services especially, at the time while communion is being administered and the ablutions performed. This form comes from a book of devotion, "The Habit of Holiness," by Martin Warner.

Make an Act of Spiritual Communion to unite your intention with that of the whole Church:

Lord Jesus Christ,

saving Victim, Priest divine,

in union with the faithful at every altar of your Church where your body and blood are offered to the Father, I make an oblation of praise and thanksgiving. I believe that you are truly present in the Eucharist. To you I offer my soul, my body, and my life. Come to my heart, embrace me with your love. Conform my will to the pattern of your perfect obedience, so that loving all that you love, I may never be separated from you, but live to the glory of God. Amen.

Pray the Lord's Prayer:

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy Name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.

Meditate on the soul's mystical union with Christ; 14th c. poem, 'Anima Christi' is a good place to start:

Soul of Christ, sanctify me.

Body of Christ, save me.

Blood of Christ, inebriate me.

Water from the side of Christ, wash me.

Passion of Christ, strengthen me.

Within thy wounds hide me.

Suffer me not to be separated from thee.

From the malicious enemy defend me.

In the hour of my death, call me

and bid me come to thee,

That with thy saints I may praise thee

For ever and ever.

O most merciful redeemer, friend and brother,



InAsMuch Offering August: The Suitcase Clinic

First, we want to say thank you for those who helped our August InAsMuch! We raised \$125 for the UC Berkeley Food Pantry. Thank you all for sending checks and donating online!

Staffed primarily by undergraduate students at UC Berkeley and community volunteers, the Suitcase Clinic in Berkeley provides healthcare and social services at four locations in Berkeley. Prior to COVID-19 as many as 40-60 clients received weekly services on Tuesday night at the **General Clinic**, at The First Presbyterian Church between Dana and Haste Streets. Notices are posted outside the General Clinic as services such as optometry, health van, laundry and ear acupuncture are subject to change. **The Women's Clinic** serves women and children, located at LIFE Adventist church at 2236 Parker Street Berkeley. The **Youth /LGBTQ + Clinic** at St. Mark's strives to provide appropriate and culturally accessible services to homeless and street-identified youth in their teens and twenties. Their goal is to increase opportunities for positive physical and social well-being. Massage, foot washes, dinner, needle exchange, and a warm welcome are provided. **Congregation Beth El** at 1301 Oxford Street provides a monthly dinner. Volunteers distribute health supplies and medical attention is provided by the UC San Francisco's Joint Medical Program.
