Second Sunday of Advent; Year B December 6th, 2020; 10:00 a.m. - Livestream

Welcome to St. Mark's!

From ancient time the Church has observed an extended period of preparation before each of its two greatest feasts: Easter, with the forty days of Lent; and Christ's Nativity, with the four weeks (formerly forty days) of Advent. In each of these seasons of preparation, Christians spend time taking stock of the world around them, of their own hearts, and of the central promises and convictions of the faith. Advent, with its twin focus on the beginning and the end, invites us to a particularly open-eyed perspective: the familiar characters of John the Baptist, the prophet Isaiah, Mary and Joseph and their Baby, together with the familiar patterns of holiday music, shopping, and loved ones, meet the strange and unfamiliar themes of darkness and impending doom, the intuition that something is not quite right and needs mending, the conviction that God is coming to bring justice but that such justice will render us disoriented and without recourse to the old reference points. We keep our eyes open to take in as much of this disharmony as we can, while the uneasy tension between the familiar and the unfamiliar points us to the central mystery: the Word of God was born a baby, that we might know God not by words alone but by love, with all the risk and sacrifice love entails, with all its possibility and creative potential. At St. Mark's this Advent, we invite you to join us in our preparation to receive that baby: join us as we read again the great prophecies of Scripture, as we sing the Advent hymns of expectation and longing, as we spend time in prayer and meditation, service and worship. So might our hearts be fit to bear that Love which Mary bore, who bears us all till his kingdom come.





The Word of God

First Lesson

Isaiah 40:1-11

Comfort, O comfort my people, says your God. Speak tenderly to Jerusalem, and cry to her that she has served her term, that her penalty is paid, that she has received from the Lord's hand double for all her sins. A voice cries out: "In the wilderness prepare the way of the Lord, make straight in the desert a highway for our God. Every valley shall be lifted up, and every mountain and hill be made low; the uneven ground shall become level, and the rough places a plain. Then the glory of the Lord shall be revealed, and all people shall see it together, for the mouth of the Lord has spoken." A voice says, "Cry out!" And I said, "What shall I cry?" All people are grass, their constancy is like the flower of the field. The grass withers, the flower fades, when the breath of the Lord blows upon it; surely the people are grass. The grass withers, the flower fades; but the word of our God will stand for ever. Get you up to a high mountain, O Zion, herald of good tidings; lift up your voice with strength, O Jerusalem, herald of good tidings, lift it up, do not fear; say to the cities of Judah, "Here is your God!" See, the Lord God comes with might, and his arm rules for him; his reward is with him, and his recompense before him. He will feed his flock like a shepherd; he will gather the lambs in his arms, and carry them in his bosom, and gently lead the mother sheep.

Second Lesson 2 Peter 3:8-15a

Do not ignore this one fact, beloved, that with the Lord one day is like a thousand years, and a thousand years are like one day. The Lord is not slow about his promise, as some think of slowness, but is patient with you, not wanting any to perish, but all to come to repentance. But the day of the Lord will come like a thief, and then the heavens will pass away with a loud noise, and the elements will be dissolved with fire, and the earth and everything that is done on it will be disclosed. Since all these things are to be dissolved in this way, what sort of persons ought you to be in leading lives of holiness and godliness, waiting for and hastening the coming of the day of God, because of which the heavens will be set ablaze and dissolved, and the elements will melt with fire? But, in accordance with his promise, we wait for new heavens and a new earth, where righteousness is at home. Therefore, beloved, while you are waiting for these things, strive to be found by him at peace, without spot or blemish; and regard the patience of our Lord as salvation.



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The Holy Gospel

Mark 1:1-8

¶The Gospeller introduces the Gospel and the people respond with "Glory to you, Lord Christ."

The beginning of the good news of Jesus Christ, the Son of God. As it is written in the prophet Isaiah, "See, I am sending my messenger ahead of you, who will prepare your way; the voice of one crying out in the wilderness: 'Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight,'" John the baptizer appeared in the wilderness, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. And people from the whole Judean countryside and all the people of Jerusalem were going out to him, and were baptized by him in the river Jordan, confessing their sins. Now John was clothed with camel's hair, with a leather belt around his waist, and he ate locusts and wild honey. He proclaimed, "The one who is more powerful than I is coming after me; I am not worthy to stoop down and untie the thong of his sandals. I have baptized you with water; but he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit."

A Form for Spiritual Communion

In times like these where it is imprudent or impossible for all to receive Holy Communion, it is still possible to make an act of spiritual communion. The following devotion can be made at any time when you are prevented from being present at the Eucharist, but we encourage you to use it during these weeks of live-streamed services especially, at the time while communion is being administered and the ablutions performed. This form comes from a book of devotion, "The Habit of Holiness," by Martin Warner.

Make an Act of Spiritual Communion to unite your intention with that of the whole Church:

Lord Jesus Christ, saving Victim, Priest divine,

in union with the faithful at every altar of your Church

where your body and blood are offered to the Father,

I make an oblation of praise and thanksgiving.

I believe that you are truly present in the Eucharist.

To you I offer my soul, my body, and my life.

Come to my heart, embrace me with your love.

Conform my will to the pattern of your perfect obedience,

so that loving all that you love, I may never be separated from you,

but live to the glory of God. Amen.

Pray the Lord's Prayer:

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy Name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.





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The Blue Advent Vestments

Made of raw silk, all the pieces were designed and sewn by Marjorie Pettyjohn, Head of our Altar Guild. The set consists of a chasuble, three priest stoles, one Byzantine deacon stole, maniple, altar frontal, pulpit fall, lectern hangings, and two burse and matching veil sets, one large and one small.

Deborah Falk designed and hand-painted on white silk the panels, 32 in all, as orphreys, bands of fabric decorating the various pieces. The designs, one of lilies, one of roses, portray flower symbols of purity, attributes of the Virgin Mary. The lily panels decorate the vestments worn by the clergy, and the rose panels all the others.

The set was presented and blessed on the First Sunday of Advent, November 29, 1998.

The monthly InAsMuch Offering at St. Mark's is named after Jesus' challenge in the Gospel of Matthew to give drink to the thirsty, clothe the naked, take care of the sick, and visit those in prison: "Inasmuch as you have done it unto one of the least of these . . . , you have done it unto me."

The Paw Fund's was organized in the East Bay in 2011 and granted nonprofit status by the IRS in 2013. Jill, the founder, moved here in 1997 and saw that there was great need for affordable vet care in the homeless communities, and was especially concerned with the population of abandoned pets at Albany Bulb, after the homeless encampments were evicted in 2000. The Paw Fund's goal is to provide low and no-cost healthcare for pets, and referrals to community members in Contra Costa and Alameda counties. They hold a free monthly vaccine clinic for cats and dogs, offer free or "pay what you can" spay and neuter services. They also provide micro-chipping at adoption services. Here is their website: http://pawfund.org/

The Paw Fund's goal in their words:

"The idea behind Paw Fund is simple. We help people help their pets. And when everyone can provide basic care to their pets, everyone's pets benefit. When pets are vaccinated against the diseases that most commonly affect them, when pets are spayed or neutered, when pets are treated for everyday minor medical issues like fleas or worms, the entire community is better off. Our programs work by partnering with veterinarians, public and private agencies, and most importantly with pet owners who may not be able access or afford regular vet care. By keeping pets healthy, we help to keep pets in their homes and out of animal shelters. The more we help pet owners take care of their companion animals, the fewer pets end up in our overcrowded city and county shelters."

Note from the Director of Music:

"What is the crying at Jordan?" (Hymn 69 in The Hymnal 1982) was written by **Carol Christopher Drake**, a member of St. Mark's Choir in the 1950s. It voices a response to John the Baptist's "crying in the wilderness," of his demand that people change their lives in preparation for the coming of the Messiah. She wrote this text specifically for the present tune, St. Mark's, Berkeley, which in her words "evoked a sense of mystery and awe." The tune's first American use was in the children's songbook "Sing for Joy," compiled and edited by **Norman and Margaret Mealy**, who "were attracted to it for its haunting and simple quality." It came from a Gaelic collection, Dánta Dé (Dublin 1928). The tune had no name in Dánta Dé. A former beloved choirmaster of St. Mark's, Norman named it for St. Mark's, Berkeley, his home parish, where he served as choirmaster from 1948-1962. He also served as Professor of Church Music at the Church Divinity School of the Pacific - Episcopal (CDSP) in Berkeley from 1952-1987 and at the Graduate Theological Union from 1976-1987. We thank Norman and Meg for this gift to the church here and at large. Meg passed away this year on September 13.
