
From ancient time the Church has observed an extended period of preparation before each of its two greatest feasts: Easter, with the forty days of Lent; and Christ's Nativity, with the four weeks (formerly forty days) of Advent. In each of these seasons of preparation, Christians spend time taking stock of the world around them, of their own hearts, and of the central promises and convictions of the faith. Advent, with its twin focus on the beginning and the end, invites us to a particularly open-eved perspective: the familiar characters of John the Baptist, the prophet Isaiah, Mary and Joseph and their Baby, together with the familiar patterns of holiday music, shopping, and loved ones, meet the strange and unfamiliar themes of darkness and impending doom, the intuition that something is not quite right and needs mending, the conviction that God is coming to bring justice but that such justice will render us disoriented and without recourse to the old reference points. We keep our eyes open to take in as much of this disharmony as we can, while the uneasy tension between the familiar and the unfamiliar points us to the central mystery: the Word of God was born a baby, that we might know God not by words alone but by love, with all the risk and sacrifice love entails, with all its possibility and creative potential. At St. Mark's this Advent, we invite you to join us in our preparation to receive that baby: join us as we read again the great prophecies of Scripture, as we sing the Advent hymns of expectation and longing, as we spend time in prayer and meditation, service and worship. So might our hearts be fit to bear that Love which Mary bore, who bears us all till his kingdom come.

A Form for Spiritual Communion

In times like these where it is imprudent or impossible for all to receive Holy Communion, it is still possible to make an act of spiritual communion. The following devotion can be made at any time when you are prevented from being present at the Eucharist, but we encourage you to use it during these weeks of live-streamed services especially, at the time while communion is being administered and the ablutions performed. This form comes from a book of devotion, "The Habit of Holiness," by Martin Warner.

Make an Act of Spiritual Communion to unite your intention with that of the whole Church:

Lord Jesus Christ, saving Victim, Priest divine, in union with the faithful at every altar of your Church where your body and blood are offered to the Father, I make an oblation of praise and thanksgiving. I believe that you are truly present in the Eucharist. To you I offer my soul, my body, and my life. Come to my heart, embrace me with your love. Conform my will to the pattern of your perfect obedience, so that loving all that you love, I may never be separated from you, but live to the glory of God. Amen.

Pray the Lord's Prayer:

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy Name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.

Meditate on the soul's mystical union with Christ; 14th c. poem, 'Anima Christi' is a good place to start:

Soul of Christ, sanctify me. Body of Christ, save me. Blood of Christ, inebriate me. Water from the side of Christ, wash me. Passion of Christ, strengthen me. Within thy wounds hide me. 
Offer a prayer of thanksgiving; this is one by St. Richard of Chichester:

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
The Blue Advent Vestments

Made of raw silk, all the pieces were designed and sewn by Marjorie Pettyjohn, Head of the Altar Guild. The set consists of a chasuble, three priest stoles, one Byzantine deacon stole, maniple, altar frontal, pulpit fall, lectern hangings, and two burse and matching veil sets, one large and one small.

Deborah Falk designed and hand-painted on white silk the panels, 32 in all, as orphreys, bands of fabric decorating the various pieces. The designs, one of lilies, one of roses, portray flower symbols of purity, attributes of the Virgin Mary. The lily panels decorate the vestments worn by the clergy, and the rose panels all the others.

The set was presented and blessed on the First Sunday of Advent, November 29, 1998.

The set of blue vestments for the season of Advent were given to St. Mark's by: Deborah Falk – in loving memory of her mother, Judith Elizabeth Strohm Bond.

From the Director of Music:

Months ago at the beginning of the pandemic, congregant Iris Commins made me and others this wonderful mask.

Upon further study, I discovered that the music printed here is one of the three famous organ chorale settings from the Great Eighteen Chorale Preludes, (BWV 651-668) composed by J.S. Bach of the great Advent Hymn, *Nun komm der Heiden Heiland (Hymn 54)*. https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Great Eighteen Chorale Preludes

I began working on this piece in my late 20's while in graduate school, but I was never able to finish it because it was simply too difficult for me to muster the energy to learn it. Being that it is a trio setting, it is one of most difficult genres for an organist to learn.

Trios are pieces that are not entered into lightly as there are three independent lines, somewhat like rubbing, in alternative directions,

your stomach and tapping your head.

After some reflection, I made a promise to myself and to Iris that I would take the time to practice and learn this piece and eventually offer it in the liturgy on Advent IV. The good news is that I was able to keep the promise! So, this Sunday, I will offer this stellar setting after spending over three months learning it. I hope that you enjoy it and take some time to really listen to how Bach sets this haunting melody. Prior to playing the Bach, I will offer an additional setting of the melody by contemporary composer Gerald Near. Following the Bach, we will sing the chorale as our Entrance Hymn. Last Sunday, I played the other two settings (BWV 659 and BWV 661) for the opening and closing voluntaries. By my offering this additional setting, the trio of the settings has come full-circle!

I would like to thank Iris for providing the inspiration for me to finally learn this piece. In not now, when? I also express gratitude for the time to learn the piece, despite the reason for having a "little" more time.
