Welcome to St. Mark's!


With its emphasis on the desert, repentance, and our own culpability for human sin and global suffering, Lent hardly seems a fitting sequel to the Epiphany, or its characteristic light, revelation, and knowledge. Yet such a sequel it is, bringing us face to face with the incompleteness of all our knowledge and the final failure of our skill, even while God continues to draw closer in Jesus Christ. That presence reveals all our lack, and burns away what is not true or good; but it is not finally destructive. Rather it completes what the Epiphany began, the revelation that God is in the business of drawing us past whatever final answer we might want to give, past whatever finality sin and death might claim, making us finally a part of his own deathless life. Wherever you find yourself this Lent, may you find Christ drawing near, to make you party to his own resurrection.





The Word of God

First Lesson

Numbers 21:4-9

From Mount Hor the Israelites set out by the way to the Red Sea, to go around the land of Edom; but the people became impatient on the way. The people spoke against God and against Moses, "Why have you brought us up out of Egypt to die in the wilderness? For there is no food and no water, and we detest this miserable food." Then the Lord sent poisonous serpents among the people, and they bit the people, so that many Israelites died. The people came to Moses and said, "We have sinned by speaking against the Lord and against you; pray to the Lord to take away the serpents from us." So Moses prayed for the people. And the Lord said to Moses, "Make a poisonous serpent, and set it on a pole; and everyone who is bitten shall look at it and live." Second Lesson Ephesians 2:1-10

You were dead through the trespasses and sins in which you once lived, following the course of this world, following the ruler of the power of the air, the spirit that is now at work among those who are disobedient. All of us once lived among them in the passions of our flesh, following the desires of flesh and senses, and we were by nature children of wrath, like everyone else. But God, who is rich in mercy, out of the great love with which he loved us even when we were dead through our trespasses, made us alive together with Christ-- by grace you have been saved-- and raised us up with him and seated us with him in the heavenly places in Christ Jesus, so that in the ages to come he might show the immeasurable riches of his grace in kindness toward us in Christ Jesus. For by grace you have been saved through faith, and this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God-- not the result of works, so that no one may boast. For we are what he has made us, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand to be our way of life.

The Holy Gospel

John 3:14-21

A Form for Spiritual Communion

In times like these where it is imprudent or impossible for all to receive Holy Communion, it is still possible to make an act of spiritual communion. The following devotion can be made at any time when you are prevented from being present at the Eucharist, but we encourage you to use it during these weeks of live-streamed services especially, at the time while communion is being administered and the ablutions performed. This form comes from a book of devotion, "The Habit of Holiness," by Martin Warner.

Make an Act of Spiritual Communion to unite your intention with that of the whole Church:

Lord Jesus Christ, saving Victim, Priest divine, in union with the faithful at every altar of your Church where your body and blood are offered to the Father, I make an oblation of praise and thanksgiving. I believe that you are truly present in the Eucharist. To you I offer my soul, my body, and my life. Come to my heart, embrace me with your love. Conform my will to the pattern of your perfect obedience, so that loving all that you love, I may never be separated from you, but live to the glory of God. Amen.

Pray the Lord's Prayer:

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy Name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.



March InAsMuch Offering for the Alameda County Community Food Bank

Coordinated by the Social Justice Committee, St Mark's sponsors a monthly InAsMuch Offering named after Jesus' challenge in the Gospel of Matthew to feed the hungry, give drink to the thirsty, welcome the stranger, clothe the naked, take care of the sick, and visit those in prison: "Inasmuch as you have done it unto one of the least of these... you have done it unto me." The Alameda County Community Food Bank (ACCFB) is a non-profit organization that supplies food to 275 Alameda County agencies, including food pantries, soup kitchens, child-care and senior centers, and after-school programs - also our own Hot Meals program. It also provides an emergency food helpline and teaches nutrition and hunger education, as well as doing outreach for California's food stamps program, CalFresh. Located in Oakland, ACCFB distributes food for 300,000 meals weekly, with almost 50% of the food supply coming fresh from California farms. ACCFB is a member of the California Association of Food Banks, Feeding America, and the California Hunger Action Coalition. For more information about ACCFB see www.accfb.org/. As we all know, times are hard this winter and spring. Even with the Covid vaccinations being distributed, it will be long before we can wander around in our usual friendly way. MUSIC ANNOUNCEMENTS

From the Director of Music:

This year, during the season of Lent, we will continue our pattern of singing a complete setting of the Ordinary of the Mass by a single composer. John Merbecke (1510-1585?) published his setting in *The book of C prayer noted* (London, 1550). One reads in *The Hymnal 1982 Companion*: Merbecke was "a man of distinct Reformation views for which he was almost burned at the stake in 1543." In preparation for the 1549 BCP, Merbecke, who was the leading musician at St. George's Chapel, Windsor, was most likely asked to provide the new English liturgy with suitable chant, "following the example of the 1544

Litany" which is, in effect is The Great Litany at S-67 in *The Hymnal 1982*. The settings of the Kyrie (S-90), Sanctus (S-113), and Angus Dei (S-157), are examples of focusing on the new texts and taking into account the older Sarum Chants which he used as guiding sources for his adaptations of these settings. The text *Gloria in excelsis* (S-201) is not sung or recited in Advent or Lent.

His extensive experience as an accompanist includes appearances with the San Francisco Opera Merola Program, Western Opera Theatre, San Francisco Symphony Chorus, CappellaSF, San Mateo Masterworks Chorale, San Jose Symphony, Golden Gate Men's Chorus, San Francisco Concert Chorale, San Francisco Lyric Chorus, The Choral Project of San Jose, and the Valley Concert Chorale.
