

First Lesson

The Word of God Isaiah 6:1-8

Second Lesson

Romans 8:12-17

So then, brothers and sisters, we are debtors, not to the flesh, to live according to the flesh-- for if you live according to the flesh, you will die; but if by the Spirit you put to death the deeds of the body, you will live. For all who are led by the Spirit of God are children of God. For you did not receive a spirit of slavery to fall back into fear, but you have received a spirit of adoption. When we cry, "Abba! Father!" it is that very Spirit bearing witness with our spirit that we are children of God, and if children, then heirs, heirs of God and joint heirs with Christ-- if, in fact, we suffer with him so that we may also be glorified with him.

The Holy Gospel

John 3:1-17

The Gospeller introduces the Gospel and the people respond with "Glory to you, Lord Christ."

There was a Pharisee named Nicodemus, a leader of the Jews. He came to Jesus by night and said to him, "Rabbi, we know that you are a teacher who has come from God; for no one can do these signs that you do apart from the presence of God." Jesus answered him, "Very truly, I tell you, no one can see the kingdom of God without being born from above." Nicodemus said to him, "How can anyone be born after having grown old? Can one enter a second time into the mother's womb and be born?" Jesus answered, "Very truly, I tell you, no one can enter the kingdom of God without being born of water and Spirit. What is born of the flesh is flesh, and what is born of the Spirit is spirit. Do not be astonished that I said to you, 'You must be born from above.' The wind blows where it chooses, and you hear the sound of it, but you do not know where it comes from or where it goes. So it is with everyone who is born of the Spirit." Nicodemus said to him, "How can these things be?" Jesus answered him, "Are you a teacher of Israel, and yet you do not understand these things?

"Very truly, I tell you, we speak of what we know and testify to what we have seen; yet you do not receive our testimony. If I have told you about earthly things and you do not believe, how can you believe if I tell you about heavenly things? No one has ascended into heaven except the one who descended from heaven, the Son of Man. And just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, so must the Son of Man be lifted up, that whoever believes in him may have eternal life. For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life. Indeed, God did not send the Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him."

The Gospeller concludes the Gospel and the people respond with "Praise to you, Lord Christ."

The Sermon

Nicene Creed We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen. 





A Form for Spiritual Communion

In times like these where it is imprudent or impossible for all to receive Holy Communion, it is still possible to make an act of spiritual communion. The following devotion can be made at any time when you are prevented from being present at the Eucharist, but we encourage you to use it during these weeks of live-streamed services especially, at the time while communion is being administered and the ablutions performed. This form comes from a book of devotion, "The Habit of Holiness," by Martin Warner.

Make an Act of Spiritual Communion to unite your intention with that of the whole Church: Lord Jesus Christ, saving Victim, Priest divine, in union with the faithful at every altar of your Church where your body and blood are offered to the Father, I make an oblation of praise and thanksgiving. I believe that you are truly present in the Eucharist. To you I offer my soul, my body, and my life. Come to my heart, embrace me with your love. Conform my will to the pattern of your perfect obedience, so that loving all that you love, I may never be separated from you, but live to the glory of God. Amen.

Pray the Lord's Prayer:

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy Name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.

Meditate on the soul's mystical union with Christ; the 14th c. poem, 'Anima Christi': Soul of Christ, sanctify me. Body of Christ, save me. Blood of Christ, inebriate me. Water from the side of Christ, wash me. Passion of Christ, strengthen me. Within thy wounds hide me. Suffer me not to be separated from thee. From the malicious enemy defend me. In the hour of my death, call me and bid me come to thee, That with thy saints I may praise thee For ever and ever.

Offer a prayer of thanksgiving; this is one by St. Richard of Chichester: Thanks be to thee, my Lord Jesus Christ, for all the benefits thou hast won for me, for all the pains and insults thou hast borne for me. O most merciful redeemer, friend and brother, may I know thee more clearly, love thee more dearly, and follow thee more nearly, day by day. Amen.







May InAsMuch Offering for St. Mark's Rector's Discretionary Fund (RDF)

Coordinated by the Social Justice Committee, St Mark's sponsors a monthly InAsMuch Offering named after Jesus' challenge in the Gospel of Matthew to feed the hungry, give drink to the thirsty, welcome the stranger, clothe the naked, take care of the sick, and visit those in prison: *"Inasmuch as you have done it unto one of the least of these . . . you have done it unto me."* The RDF is a parish fund used at the Rector's discretion to meet confidential requests for emergency financial help by individuals and families in the parish and the local community. Once referred to an Almoner's Fund, RDF gifts are collected "for the poor" and other "such pious and charitable uses," helping recipients respond to crucial needs like food, shelter, medical services, child-care, and transportation costs. While such help is always needed, assistance from the RDF is even more critical in time of the present COVID-19 pandemic and the health, employment, and shelter problems it has created. She spent five years in the insurance industry as an actuary and data scientist prior to grad school, and she will be interning at Nike this coming summer. Anna has been a musician for most of her life and has developed a deep appreciation and love for church music through past experiences as an organ scholar and frequent substitute organist in the greater Hartford, Connecticut area. Anna has been studying with George Emblom since her arrival in Berkeley and recently performed in an on-line recital sponsored by the San Francisco Chapter of the American Guild of Organists.

You are cordially invited to attend the next concert in the Second Sunday Evensong/Organ Recital Series sponsored by St. Mark's, Berkeley, on June 13, 2021. Evensong will be offered at 3:00 p.m. PDT via Zoom. At 4:00 p.m. PDT, organist Susan Jane Matthews will offer a Livestreamed organ recital on the Flentrop Organ. Following the recital, there will be an opportunity for a "meet and greet" with the artist.

Susan Jane Matthews has performed throughout the United States and in Europe, including solo organ recitals at St. John the Divine Cathedral, New York City; La Madeleine and St.-Sulpice, Paris; St. Paul's Cathedral, London; and the Himmerod Abbey, Germany. She has been featured on the American radio programs *Pipedreams, Organ Loft,* and *With Heart and Voice*. She specializes in the music of Fanny Hensel and Jeanne Demessieux.

Dr. Matthews has been Director of Music at St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Burlingame, California since October 2005. She is organist, director of the Chancel Choir, and founding director of the St. Paul's Choir School (2007). In 2017, she led the Choir of St. Paul's in a week-long residency at Gloucester Cathedral, England, including concerts at Blenheim Palace and Oxford University Church, and will return to England with the choir for a residency at Wells Cathedral in July 2022. The choir has released two CDs under her direction: *Sweetly Singing in the Choir* (2014) and *Searching for Stars* (2019). She previously served as Director of Music at St. Michael's Episcopal Cathedral, Boise, Idaho, and as Principal Organist of Grace Cathedral, San Francisco, where she has recorded two solo organ CDs for the Gothic label: *Chosen Tunes* (2004) and *More Chosen Tunes* (2016).

Dr. Matthews completed a Bachelor of Arts *Phi Beta Kappa* at Haverford College (Haverford, PA) with honors in chemistry, and Master of Music and Doctor of Musical Arts (DMA) in organ performance and literature at the Eastman School of Music (Rochester, NY) as a student of David Higgs. She has served as Dean of the San Francisco and Les Bois Chapters (Boise) of the American Guild of Organists, and as a faculty member at the San Francisco Chapter 2005 Pipe Organ Encounter. She has performed and presented choral and organ workshops for national conferences of the Association of Anglican Musicians and American Guild of Organists, including several lecture recitals on the life and organ works of Jeanne Demessieux. Dr. Matthews is on the Board of Directors of the Royal School of Church Music of America

(RSCMA) and has served as an assistant director at the Pacific Northwest RSCM summer training course, and as organist and junior girls headmaster at the RSCM summer training course at King's College in her hometown of Wilkes-Barre, Pennsylvania. She was appointed an Associate of the RSCM in Fall 2019.
