These are great feasts! This year may you find them inspiring your imagination, and their promises taking root in your heart.







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The Holy Gospel

John 6:47-58

Very truly, I tell you, whoever believes has eternal life. I am the bread of life. Your ancestors ate the manna in the wilderness, and they died. This is the bread that comes down from heaven, so that one may eat of it and not die. I am the living bread that came down from heaven. Whoever eats of this bread will live forever; and the bread that I will give for the life of the world is my flesh." The Jews then disputed among themselves, saying, "How can this man give us his flesh to eat?" So Jesus said to them, "Very truly, I tell you, unless you eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink his blood, you have no life in you. Those who eat my flesh and drink my blood have eternal life, and I will raise them up on the last day; for my flesh is true food and my blood is true drink. A Form for Spiritual Communion

In times like these where it is imprudent or impossible for all to receive Holy Communion, it is still possible to make an act of spiritual communion. The following devotion can be made at any time when you are prevented from being present at the Eucharist, but we encourage you to use it during these weeks of live-streamed services especially, at the time while communion is being administered and the ablutions performed. This form comes from a book of devotion, "The Habit of Holiness," by Martin Warner.

Make an Act of Spiritual Communion to unite your intention with that of the whole Church:

Lord Jesus Christ,

saving Victim, Priest divine,

in union with the faithful at every altar of your Church

where your body and blood are offered to the Father,

I make an oblation of praise and thanksgiving.

I believe that you are truly present in the Eucharist.

To you I offer my soul, my body, and my life.

Come to my heart, embrace me with your love.

Conform my will to the pattern of your perfect obedience,

so that loving all that you love, I may never be separated from you,

but live to the glory of God. Amen.

Pray the Lord's Prayer:

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy Name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.

Meditate on the soul's mystical union with Christ; the 14th c. poem, 'Anima Christi':

Soul of Christ, sanctify me.

Body of Christ, save me.

Blood of Christ, inebriate me.

Water from the side of Christ, wash me.

Within thy wounds hide me.





June InAsMuch Offering for Berkeley Food and Housing Project (BFHP)

Coordinated by the Social Justice Committee, St Mark's sponsors a monthly InAsMuch Offering named after Jesus' challenge in the Gospel of Matthew to feed the hungry, give drink to the thirsty, welcome the stranger, clothe the naked, take care of the sick, and visit those in prison: "Inasmuch as you have done it unto one of the least of these . . . you have done it unto me."

The people of the Berkeley Food and Housing Project work to make homelessness less harsh, with the ultimate goal of ending homelessness in our communities. They do this by "providing emergency food and shelter, transitional housing, rapid rehousing and permanent supportive housing with support services to individuals and families experiencing homelessness."

Their roots go back to 1970 when volunteers from the University Lutheran Chapel started The Meal Project, which was renamed Berkeley Emergency Life Line in 1972. In 1986 they incorporated, becoming the Berkeley Emergency Food Project, and got permission to use the basement of the Veteran's Memorial building in downtown Berkeley as a men's shelter. In 1991 they got use of 2140 Dwight Way for a women's and children's shelter, providing 24 month transitional housing and case management for severely mentally ill women. They now have a variety of buildings and staff to provide their services to our community, and helped almost 3,000 people in the 2019-2020 fiscal year. They are one of the largest service providers for the homeless in the East Bay, and roughly ten percent of their funding comes from donations. Thank you for supporting this important community organization!

You are cordially invited to attend the next concert in the Second Sunday Evensong/Organ Recital Series sponsored by St. Mark's, Berkeley, on June 13, 2021. Evensong will be offered at 3:00 p.m. PDT via Zoom. At 4:00 p.m. PDT, organist Susan Jane Matthews will offer a Livestreamed organ recital on the Flentrop Organ. Following the recital, there will be an opportunity for a "meet and greet" with the artist.

Susan Jane Matthews has performed throughout the United States and in Europe, including solo organ recitals at St. John the Divine Cathedral, New York City; La Madeleine and St.-Sulpice, Paris; St. Paul's Cathedral, London; and the Himmerod Abbey, Germany. She has been featured on the American radio programs *Pipedreams, Organ Loft,* and *With Heart and Voice*. She specializes in the music of Fanny Hensel and Jeanne Demessieux.

Dr. Matthews has been Director of Music at St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Burlingame, California since October 2005. She is organist, director of the Chancel Choir, and founding director of the St. Paul's Choir School (2007). In 2017, she led the Choir of St. Paul's in a week-long residency at Gloucester Cathedral, England, including concerts at Blenheim Palace and Oxford University Church, and will return to England with the choir for a residency at Wells Cathedral in July 2022. The choir has released two CDs under her direction: *Sweetly Singing in the Choir* (2014) and *Searching for Stars* (2019). She previously served as Director of Music at St. Michael's Episcopal Cathedral, Boise, Idaho, and as Principal Organist of Grace Cathedral, San Francisco, where she has recorded two solo organ CDs for the Gothic label: *Chosen Tunes* (2004) and *More Chosen Tunes* (2016).

Dr. Matthews completed a Bachelor of Arts *Phi Beta Kappa* at Haverford College (Haverford, PA) with honors in chemistry, and Master of Music and Doctor of Musical Arts (DMA) in organ performance and literature at the Eastman School of Music (Rochester, NY) as a student of David Higgs. She has served as Dean of the San Francisco and Les Bois Chapters (Boise) of the American Guild of Organists, and as a faculty member at the San Francisco Chapter 2005 Pipe Organ Encounter. She has performed and presented choral and organ workshops for national conferences of the Association of Anglican Musicians and American Guild of Organists, including several lecture recitals on the life and organ works of Jeanne Demessieux. Dr. Matthews is on the Board of Directors of the Royal School of Church Music of America (RSCMA) and has served as an assistant director at the Pacific Northwest RSCM summer training course, and as organist and junior girls headmaster at the RSCM summer training course at King's College in her hometown of Wilkes-Barre, Pennsylvania. She was appointed an Associate of the RSCM in Fall 2019. A passionate advocate for women musicians in the church, she has had articles on girl choristers and women composers published in the RSCM America newsletter, the RSCM Church Music Quarterly and the Journal of the Association of Anglican Musicians, and is the founding coordinator for *A Great Host of Composers*.
